Uncovered: Abbotsford's Forgotten Soldiers From World War One

BC – On June 11, 2019 the Royal Canadian Legion BC/Yukon Command will be interviewing current Legion member, former University of the Fraser Valley professor and author of the book "Abbotsford's Forgotten Soldiers From World War One," Peter William Slade.

Slade endured long hours of detective work to uncover over a dozen overlooked World War I soldiers not present on the Abbotsford Cenotaph. "If people went through that, they have a right to be recognized," says Slade, a former Legion vice-president. Thanks to Slade's detective work so far, 19 men who lost their lives during World War I have been added to the cenotaph plaque in Abbotsford. On a 2017 trip to France Peter William Slade placed crosses of gratitude for some of these men at their gravesite. These crosses of gratitude were a thank you from the City of Abbotsford for their service.

The Royal Canadian Legion BC/Yukon Command has the pleasure of being able to interview Slade to learn more about the great work he has done for these men, their families and the City of Abbotsford. During this interview we hope to learn more about Slade and his book as well as the incredible journey that lead to these discoveries. We also will find out more about his time as a member of the Legion and how that has helped along the way.
